Hershey

This is a story about loss and love. This is a story about emptiness and fulfillment. This is a story about recovery and mended hearts. This is our story about Hershey.

We have always had the good fortune to surround ourselves with lots of animals. Cats, birds, fish, snakes, lizards and dogs contributed to our family throughout the years. Our pets have always been a source of joy and delight as well as enrichment.

On May 4, 2010, our 12-year old English Bulldog, Murphy, died after major abdominal surgery. Ed and I were by her side to say, "So long." It was a devastating loss for all who knew this old and beloved soul. The house seemed empty without Murphy and so still without her soft snoring in the background. Kermit, our nine-year old Yorkie, was lonely and depressed as he continued to look for Murphy. Our hearts were broken and with her passing, a piece of us felt as if it had been taken away.

Over the years, we had studied various dogs to educate ourselves on the traits, personalities and behaviors of other breeds. Long before Murphy died, we had talked about how perfect a Havanese would be for our family and after a few weeks went by following the loss of Murphy, we began discussing the prospect of finding a new dog. Kermit needed a pal and we needed a new family member. It's that time of year again! Ghosts, goblins, witches and whatever the latest trend for dressing up the little ones might be. Here are some tips for keeping your furry kids safe during this particular holiday.

We all know chocolate is lethal in large amounts, and can make our pups very sick in even the smallest amounts. Keep in mind that Xylitol, used to sweeten sugar free gum and candy, is also toxic for dogs. Wrappers are hazardous, and can cause intestinal blockage, especially in our smaller, furrier family members.

Dressing our pups in costumes is great fun for us but the dogs might not be digging it as much. Try on their costumes at least the day before, and make sure they seem comfortable wearing their new duds. If it's too anxiety-provoking for them, give up the full costume idea and go with a festive handkerchief, a simple T-shirt or sweater. He is happy and very energetic and loves to chase Kermit around the house. They scamper here and there until Kermit dives under a chair or the couch for refuge and rest and then, in a few minutes, off the two of them go!

Hershey loves finding an errant tissue on the floor and is delighted by the feather duster. His favorite resting place is on the top of a leather chair where he perches behind Ed's head. From this vantage point, Hershey doesn't miss a thing happening in the kitchen. True to his breed, Hershey is great with new people and is a curious little fellow ... always ready for the next fun thing. And, when the day is over he settles in for the night with his head on a pillow between the two of us while Kermit is snoozing away at the end of the bed.

Obedience training started today in our home. Hershey is an excellent student and is responding well to the trainer's guidance. We are confident Hershey will become an even more charming family member once he has completed his course work. Hershey is definitely a smart guy and eager to please.
